STAN PALEN'S Komputer Korner

This column includes hints, helps, suggestions and news for IBM compatible computers.

This quarter was much better than the last one. I had no major computer problems. My backups are working now. I learned last time that it pays to check to see if your back ups are working.

Phone Photos: I took some pictures with my phone and I wanted to get them off without going through the phone company. I got an SD Micro card that fits in the phone, and tried to move the pictures to the card. I did not see an option for that anywhere. I also have a picture that I like to use as back ground. I put that picture on the card, but my phone would not let me move the picture to the phone's memory so I could use it as background. Maybe it is on a menu I have not located yet. I have discovered that if you tell the phone to save pictures to the card, you can remove the card and plug it into my computer to see the pictures.

My daughter had some pictures on her phone that she wanted to put on her computer. Her phone would allow her to save the pictures to the card. I took the card and put it in my computer and looked at the files. The pictures are in a proprietary format. The files end in a .tn. A search on the Internet turned up several programs that claimed to be able to open them. I am concerned that these programs might have malicious content. I am still searching for a solution. Most appeared to be free until you got to the part about using the program. I have tried 4 of them so far and I still cannot see the pictures.

Transporting Power Point Files:

A clockmaker prepared a PowerPoint presentation on his computer, but had problems when he went to give the presentation. He had sound and video files that were on his computer, but not on the USB drive. Even if he had copied the files to the drive, they would not be in the same place when the computer went looking for them. One way around this is to create a new folder to create your presentation in. All of your referenced files need to be here too. Then when you finish, you can copy all the files in this new folder to your USB drive. To be safe, I would also make a copy to a CD or DVD. When I go to do a presentation, I will usually have my presentation in at least two forms. If something can go wrong, it usually will. It also pays to try your program on another computer if you can.

BlueTooth Blues: I have a hands free wireless Blue tooth ear piece for my phone. I do not like it. It flops around when I wear it. People cannot hear me very well either. I have started researching the best one to buy. I had one before that plugged into my previous phone. My current one does not allow this. My old one had a microphone that reached much closer to my mouth than the Blue tooth ones I have seen that sit on the ear. The button on my current one needs to be pushed fairly hard and it is painful to the ear when I try to use it. There is no good way to evaluate something by yourself like this without using it for a while. This can lead to some expensive mistakes. I know noise cancellation should be one requirement.

For electronics evaluation I use www.cnet.com. They have several Blue tooth headsets that they have reviewed. The better ones cost quite a bit more than the one I have. Virginia does not require hands free systems for cell phone use, but most of the states I travel through do. With mine I have to cup my hand around the thing to have it work right, so it does not serve the

purpose for which it was intended.

MicrSet Info: I have purchased a MicroSet Watchmaker Pro. I have not had a chance to use it much yet. It does do a much better job of monitoring watches than the standard Microset. With the standard Microset, I had a hard time setting the volume level of the pickup to catch the right parts of the tick.

MS Office File Extensions: The latest files created by the Microsoft Office Suite, Word, Excel etc. normally save their files with a file extension of .docx. Someone may have sent you some files that you cannot open. Older versions of these programs cannot read them. Microsoft has come out with an Office Compatibility download on their website that will solve this problem. Just go to Microsoft.com and do a search on Office Compatibility.

New Products Comments: What is coming? Windows 8 is under development and so is Explorer 9. They both claim better security – especially for the novice user. Windows Phone 7 has been heavily advertised, but according to what I read, sales are not going as well as some of the competitors. The commercials make it look so easy. I hope it works easier that mine. I have one of those supposedly smart phones, but using it to browse the Internet is difficult to say the least. The small screen, the unplanned zoom in or out, the limited data plan I have, and the fact that the phone does not work at my house so I can practice makes it hard to use.

Book Readers: Have you seen these new book readers? Now there are several different ones available. The first one was Kindle. It was kind of small, so they came out with a larger one. I personally don't like to read a book that way. One of my

daughters uses hers all the time. If you decide to go buy one, you need to know if the screen can be read in bright light or low light. You also have to know how the reader gets the books. Does it do it with a WiFi connection, a phone connection (using up your minutes) or some other type. WiFi is the best because if you do not have access to one, you can get a free connection at MacDonalds, a library or many other places. Screen size, memory, color (yes or no) and access to books are the things to consider. Do your homework before plunking down your money.

YOUR HAV VOLUNTEERS


