Jeff Meizlik Demonstrates
Painting Glass at
Potomac Guild's May Meeting

On 6 May, Jeff Meizlik provid-

ed the technical program for the Potomac Guild meeting. Jeff is a retired educator/artist who specializes in cast bronze sculptures. For the past several years he has



also focused on repairing clocks and attends the Potomac Guild clock class/workshop. Several months ago he gave a multi-month program on investment casting.

Jeff's May program focused on painting the black and gold on the back of clock case glass doors.

If he needs a replacement glass, Jeff says he looks for old paintings/ art work at auctions and flea markets with the intent of finding antique glass suitable for the clock. However, ordinary new glass can also be used.

Jeff used both black and gold



paint from spray cans.
He said he had tried
both flat and glossy
black paint and was
unable to tell the difference because the glass
makes even the flat
look glossy.

Jeff demonstrated painting three shapes on the glass: rectangular, circular and elliptical.

In each case, he started by masking the center of the shape so that part of the glass would be transparent when finished. He then provided an unmasked area around the area where he wished to spray the paint. Finally he applied a second


mask around the unmasked area. This mask covered

the rest of the glass. Then he sprayed the gold paint on the unmasked area.



After allowing some drying time for the gold

paint, Jeff lifted off the large outside mask. He then sprayed black on the rest of the glass – and on the back of the newly applied gold paint. He pointed out that if one wants an antique looking gold, one should only spray the gold lightly, so that when the black is sprayed over it, some of the black will also move through the gold and appear on the front side giving an older appearance than new paint.



The black paint was allowed to dry. The central mask was removed. The result was a nice transparent hole surrounded by a gold border which was in turn surrounded by the black area.

Jeff brought along an older regulator clock where he had used the technique. He applied the gold and black around the inside of the glass of the lower part of the door so one could see the pendulum in the center. He had applied a sticker with the word "Regulator" to the inside of the glass as well. It was a very professional restoration.

How Much Is This Clock Worth?

If you are in the clock repair business, you have heard this question many times. How do you reply? Many of us suggest that 90% of the value is due to the emotional attachment - and the customer doesn't expect an answer beyond that. But what if he "really" does want an answer? There is a way to find out. Hire an appraiser!

What Is An Appraisal?

(n.) AN APPRAISAL IS THE ACT OR PROCESS OF DEVEL-OPING AN OPINION OF VALUE; AN OPINION OF VALUE.

(adj.) OF OR PERTAINING TO APPRAISING AND RELATED FUNCTIONS SUCH AS APPRAISAL PRACTICE OR APPRAISAL SERVICES.

Who Is An Appraiser?

ONE WHO IS EXPECTED TO PERFORM VALUATION SERVICES COMPETENTLY AND IN A MANNER THAT IS INDEPENDENT, IMPARTIAL AND OBJECTIVE
