A great deal of thought goes into selecting from a member or






from the pile. Members delight in stealing a gift from one another.

BACK-UP - DO IT!

Did you make a new year's resolution to take care of your computer? One good thing to do is make a complete back up. Not just a normal incremental backup. But one that does the whole system as today's date. Windows 7 actually has a fairly good back up. Earlier versions of Windows did not have a very good back up system. While I was looking into this, it appears that my automatic backup was not working properly, so I really need to do this myself and then verify that my automatic backups are working again. This evening when I finish using the computer, I will start the full backup. It slows down the system, so it is best to pick a time when you are not actively using it.

WINDOWS 8.1

A recent automatic upgrade to Windows 8.1 caused some folks screens to go to 20% brightness. This is a hazard that can be avoided if you only have the upgrades downloaded to your computer and then you se-



lect which ones get installed after you review the problems other folks are having online. This is fixable, but you have to dig deep in the settings to do it. My phone does some-

thing similar as the battery gets low. It shuts down many of it's activities like Bluetooth and screen brightness. After I recharge it and restart it, I have to reactivate them and reset the screen brightness. This is not nice if you discover that Bluetooth on my phone is not communicating with my vehicle. This means hands free is not working. I prefer not to be resetting it while driving.

WINDOWS 7 SUPPORT

Are you ready for the end of Windows 7. January 13, 2015 is the end of regular free regular updates. Just like XP and others, support is ending. There will be updates for security reasons or major flaws. Total support will end in January 2020. I saw one online discussion about a possible problem when trying to go from Windows 7 to the new one that may be Windows 9 or 10. There would be a normal path from Windows 8 to the new one. Time will tell. Microsoft did allow folks to upgrade around Vista.

This month is the Consumer Electronic Electronics Show (CES) in Las Vegas. Several of the discussions below are various reviews of some of the new products.

PHONE NEWS

Most urban areas now have 4G phone service. Smartphones need this high speed service to be able to support the streaming video and other high data rate traffic. Now that lots of folks have this high speed service and are comfortable with it, guess what. Here comes 5G phones. Some of the phones on display were listed as 5G capable. Carriers will need to upgrade their service and customers will want new phones to be able to take advantage of it.

TV NEWS

There were a lot of new TV's on display. Monster screens and curved screens were there. Several of the TV manufacturers have 4K super high definition screens on the market now, but there are very few ways to utilize this level of definition. No broadcast stations are using 4K that I am aware of. I do not think Blu-Ray goes that high either. I guess it could for a short period of time, but it would probably need more than one

disk for a movie. Now some of the manufacturers are making some super super high definition screens with 8K resolution. We are going to need more bandwidth.

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PROCESSER NEWS

Intel has come out with a new processor. It is called the Broadwell. Faster, smaller and uses less power. It allows laptop manufacturers to make some really thin new laptops. Some were on display at CES. Some were as thin as phones.

WEARABLE DEVICS

Lots of wearable computer devices such as watches were on display also. There were too many to list here.
