Subject: "ETA 7750 Repair Issues"

Robert will examine the typical and unique things to be found during the service of a caliber 7750 and lead an in-depth discussion of the causes/solutions for these issues in order to have a successful repair.

Robert is a CW21 and WOSTEP certified watchmaker. He has been the Technical Instructor for Breitling USA in Wilton CT since 2006. Robert graduated from the Lititz Watch Technicum in 2004. At Breitling, Robert

gives technical training to watchmakers, oversees the technical Quality Control process and analyzes repair comebacks. He was the main technical architect of a 7750-sequential workshop that has overhauled over 20 thousand movements.

## 2017 Fall Seminar Wrap-up

At the end of the 2017 convention I was asked "Do you have any suggestions for speakers for the Fall Seminar?" I offered "Call my buddy Drew Zimmerman. He works in York, and teaches at the NAWCC. He may be interested." As the events developed, two speakers from York PA agreed to come. York's Zimmerman's Jewelry has a clockmaker, Ken DeLucca, working for them who teaches for AWCI. He agreed to be a seminar speaker. Thus a great seminar program came out of this - A Daily Double.

I sensed something special was happening, In the weeks just before the seminar interest was up. Registration was larger than usual, Interest was spiking for some reason. I've concluded that when high quality speakers are booked, attendance increases.

Drew gave me some indication of what was to come. Our speakers brought their friends. Peter and Jim rode up with Drew and Ken. Their van arrived with lots of lecture and demonstration equipment. There was something for everyone.

Ken started the seminar with Clock program that was geared for the beginner.

The beginners and students got a lot out of it. Several people praised Ken's program. Ken is a real gentleman, he found that I was a native of Louisiana and wore his Tabasco tie for his presentation.

Drew chronicled his program with his own videos. "As a watchmaker you must do procedures that do not allow for creativity. I wanted to explore something that could expand my interests." He started making short films using his mobile phone movie feature. This developed into a side business of making commercial shorts using equipment he purchased on Amazon.com. Cameras, storage equipment, and horology tools were ordered and shipped to the shop. And with his Amazon finds, he documented the development of his repair facility at his home.

This seminar was interesting and compelling for those who attended it. It is a great supplement to our continuing education. Bi-Annual education is the biggest asset to our work, as our vocation is an ever evolving science. # STAN PALEN'S Komputer Korner

This column includes hints, helps, suggestions and news for IBM compatible computers.

A kind of disaster happened last month. A blue screen of death appeared on my main computer. I was able to restart the machine. I had to turn it off. Then when I turned it back on, it went off right away. A few minutes later I tried again. It went through the normal boot sequence. I can do the same sequence to get it back up which lasts from moments to 24 hours. Since I use several computers, I have started using two drives on my router. Saving to those gives me some safety from a machine crash.

I tried all kinds of things to find the problem. The first thing I did was back up to an earlier restore point. The directions on the blue screen said look at the crash dump. Lots of gibberish. Several sites offered to help me for a few dollars. A few of the free ones located a program to decipher the dump and gave me the file that was supposedly causing the problem. I could not find it on my machine.

I ran Malwarebytes,



Ccleaner,
McAfee, Glary
Utilities and
several others
on my machine.
Nothing seemed to
find the problem.
Dell Utilities and

memory diagnostics were also run.

I found Reimage.com and gave that a try. It does a scan and tells you what it thinks is wrong and then it wants \$ to fix it. I did not try it.

So I went to plan B and ordered a new computer. It came and then there was the problem of moving all my programs. I found a program called EaseUS Todo PCTrans Free. I have web editing software that was my primary concern. It did a great job on that and one more program. Two transfers are free. The whole machine is about \$46. I considered it, but decided to pass. I did the rest manually. The biggest problem was with Thunderbird (My email Program). It stores all my email in an unorthodox place.

I searched on line to find a solution and found one that had a step by step procedure that worked just fine, but there were a lot of steps. I did not lose my emails or any of my settings.

I have emails back through 1997 and they are all searchable. I only save the ones that I want to keep.

Plan B was not all roses either. I thought I was getting a fairly decent computer for around \$600. This thing has half the number of USB ports that the other one had. I plugged in a USB hub and got the message that something was plugged in to a USB port that the port did not have enough power to support and to unplug it. There may be something internal about power. It also has a CD slot that is vertical. You have to be careful or the disk will fall on the floor.

Have you had a problem with folks sending you an attachment that ended in .dat? It is one of those lovely Microsoft Outlook that packages your attachment for sending. It is not fun to try and open it unless you are using the same version of Outlook. I found a website that will open it for you in its' original format. It is winmaildat.com.

How secure is your bank account? A friend had her bank account hacked. Someone got into her account and using Bill Pay wrote checks to folks. In order not to

arouse suspicion they used names of folks she had written checks to before. They had folks in other parts of the country set up accounts in those names so they could accept checks. They were so far into her account that they could transfer money from her savings account to her checking account to cover the checks. In addition it happened on a holiday weekend. Fortunately she was doing some online banking and discovered the problem. The bank closed her account and covered the money loss. The bank did not cover the bounced check fees for the checks she had already written. In my book that is their responsibility too. It was their system that got hacked.

The lesson here is that you should set up automatic texts or notices of any activity over a certain amount on your account(s). This includes credit card accounts, bank accounts and investment accounts if you have any.
