Annual Fall Seminar in Charlottesville, Virginia

The Horological Association of Virginia held its annual Fall Seminar at the Hilton Garden Inn in Charlottesville, VA on November 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> 2019.

The expanded seminar, due to the generosity of AWCI participation, began on Saturday with the Dial and Hands restoration course for 8 lucky participants in the new AWCI

Mobile Classroom. Tom Schomaker and Jason Champion combined didactic lectures along with hands on participation for the students within the truly state of the art classroom. The comprehensive course extended into Sunday afternoon. The participants felt that the time expended was highly worthwhile for their craft and education. Thanks go to Rick Finks, of the Potomac Guild, who worked with the AWCI team to coordinate the Mobile Classroom arrangements as well

as to Tom, Jason, Maureen and the entire AWCI staff. A job well done.

The full day Sunday program featured David Lindow who explained and demonstrated the nuances of lathe function and choices for both watch makers and clock makers. # THE HORSELESS CARRIAGE comes to LYNCHBURG

Nothing has changed our lives as drastically as the invention of the Automobile. In little more than a century, it has changed where we reside, the type of houses we live in, the sort of jobs we have, and even the kind of food we eat.

The first horseless carriages, rattling, and backfiring, clattered down American streets in the late 1800's. In those days they were such rarities that in 1896, the Barnum and Bailey circus displayed an automobile as its main oddity. By 1900, there were about 8,000 automobiles in America. Each one of these cars had been painstakingly hand made, and only the wealthy could dare afford one.

The Automobile made its debut in Lynchburg in 1902 when Brother Walker Thurmand and Gustavas "Gus" Moon drove the first one down Main Street, chugging and snorting over cobblestone streets while horse riders desperately tried to control their terrified mounts. Children ran excitedly along beside this strange and new contraption while people gawked with amazement from the sidewalks.

Gus Moon, born in Amherst County, circa 1872, came to Lynchburg at a very young age. He drifted into the watch repair business at the old Henry Watts Shop at 112 Ninth Street. Later he left Watts and set up his own shop in the old drug

store at seventh and Main Street. Where the First Colony Life Insurance Co. is now located. He eventually moved his shop to a roofed over alley way between the Western Union and Reams Furniture Co. (now a vacant lot) on Main Street.

Gus said that his father named him "Gustavas", but other members of his family claim that he was simply named Gus. He used G.S. Moon for his watch repair business, since his named turned up this way in an old family Bible. Gus recalled that his father once said he named him G.T., but since his father couldn't make a "T" very well and could make a superb "S", he changed his sons name to G.S. Moon.

Ever since he rode in the first horseless carriage down Main Street in 1902, Gus had had a love affair with automobiles and mechanics in general. There was nothing that Gus had not done to a car:

He tore them down and put them back together; he even made some of the spare parts himself. Gus claimed that he

taught Senator Carter Glass(a member of Hill City Lodge) and Mr. Powell Glass how to drive.

In 1909, Gus went with Powell Glass (as his mechanic) to New York City to enter the New York to Atlanta Automobile Race. After few kickoff luncheons and parties in New York, drivers, mechanics and their flock of automobiles representing every make in the country departed on the longest speed run of the time.

Powell was driving a Pope-Toledo, and he and his mechanic were doing quite well until they reached a small town somewhere in Pennsylvania. Workmen there were digging some ditches near a bridge. Neither Powell or Gus saw one of the ditches and ran straight into it. The crash damaged the drive shaft and broke every spring in the front-end of the car. It required a full day to repair all of the damages. When the automobile was finally ready to shove off Powell and Gus were too far behind their competition to have any hope of catching them, so the disappointed Dou officially dropped out of the race in Hagerstown, MD.

For years Gus was a veritable living history of Lynchburg. He had seen a lot of changes in this town from stepping stones across Main Street to cobblestones. He saw a lot of businesses from a chewing gum factory to an automobile assembly plant, come and go. He saw the first

airplane land and take off in Lynchburg and, of course, he rode in the first automobile down Main Street.

Gus continued to drive until 1954, when he refused to renew his drives license. He Explained: "It's that new rotten rule put out by Richmond." It required Gus to renew his driver's license, which was alright by Gus except when a woman came to give him his test—that did it, Gus rebelled!

"Well, what would you say?" Fumed Gus. "They wanted me to prove to a woman that I could drive! And here I've been driving since 1902; never had an accident, never scraped a fender that I know of, and I've driven everything from one cylinder to twelve ....So I canceled the permit. Canceled it!"

Gus continued to do his watch repair work until his death. For 65 years he worked behind his repair bench.! G.S., Gustavas, "Gus" Moon died on June 19th, 1958, and with him a large and colorful portion of Lynchburg history died with him.

# STAN PALEN'S Komputer Korner

This column includes hints, helps, suggestions and news for IBM compatible computers.

Windows 7 is toast. As of January 14 this year, Microsoft will no longer support it or put out security patches. (It can happen, but rarely) They did put out a security patch for windows XP not too long ago. Businesses can pay for continued support, but it is not cheap.

So far you can get a free update from Microsoft for Windows 10. I know a lot of folks do not like it. I did not at first, but have gotten used to it and it has been improved a lot. The free update is at https://davescomputer-tips.com/upgrade-windows-7-to-windows-10-for-free-now/

Be very careful what you click on here. Lots of those prominent buttons are clickadd leads. Page down to the box that says Create Windows 10 Installation Media. Click on Download Tool Now. You probably want to avoid the other interesting looking boxes on the edges here. You absolutely need to create a back up before you start the update and also create a restore point.

If you go to Microsoft. com, it will steer you to the paid version. Also this is for the home version, not the Proone.

It will take hours. Your computer will restart several times. Be patient. Very few folks have had problems with this.

Are you sometimes frustrated by the thousands of results when you do a search? There is a method that works for specific sites. Type in the word or words you want to search for in the address bar at the top of your browser. Then put in Site: followed by the address of the site you are interested in. For instance Palen Site: havhome.org. The colon is necessary. Some browsers do not support it. Google and Edge do support it.

Several weeks ago Mic-

rosoft put out a patch (update) to Windows 10. It made a mess of some folks computers. It is strongly recommended you do not allow automatic updates. Go to Windows updates on the control panel. (or type in updates in the search box bottom left of your screen (quickest and easiest)) Select pause updates for 7 or more days. I have mine set for 2 weeks. The newsletters I get let me know which updates are ok after lot of folks have had the updates automatically with out problems. Two weeks is also enough time for Microsoft to correct them. (Sometimes)

Are you ready for another new version of Windows? Windows 10X is out for beta testing. It will probably be renamed before it goes out.

Have you tested your Internet speed lately? It is good to do every once in a while because it is a good test of how well your computer is connecting to the Internet. Fast.com is one of the test sites. If I have my VPN running my speed drops a

lot. I was very surprised to find that I have 150 Mbs (Million bits per second) sometimes way out here in the boondocks. That is a whole lot better that the teletype we had here in the house at 72 Bps (Bits per second) in the 70's.

Are you aware of Lock Screen? It is in Windows 10 and is a much safer state to leave your machine in while you are not active at the computer. The normal screen saver does not have any protection from intruders. Some Windows 10 machines have a screen saver activated. This will need to be shut down for it to work. Type Lock Screen in the search box to bring it up. The normal screen saver is no longer needed to protect your screen from burn in and is being phased out anyway.

Windows Media Center is another item that will soon disappear.
